On the early morning of the second Sunday of Advent, I was overwhelmed by sheer joy while lighting the two candles on the Advent wreath. Was this joy caused by an unintended trip to childhood experiences of participating in Mass? When children's lanterns kept the church in a dim mystic atmosphere? Perhaps it was from the stirring caused by the previous night's reflection on the SVD motto prayer: "*May the darkness of sin and the night of unbelief vanish before the light of the Word and the Spirit of grace and may the Heart of Jesus live in the hearts of all people.*" Whatever it was, I deeply felt both: the need of light in my life and its power over me.

In fact, preparing for the birth of Jesus is welcoming the Creed: "*Light from Light, true God from true God*" and allowing oneself to be illuminated, permeated, and ignited by this light, and so affirm the dignity of children of God who have seen his glory, the glory of the only begotten Son. In Jesus, we find life that gives light to humanity, darkness and night vanish before the Logos. (cf. John 1:9-14)





"Incarnation Happens Today!"

St. Arnold Janssen was enthusiastically animated with the Mystery of the Incarnation and its example of Kenosis. St. Paul sets forth the principle of kenosis in his beautiful hymn in Philippians 2:9-16, prefacing his comments by saying, "Let what was seen in Christ Jesus be seen also in you."

"Though his state was that of God, yet he did not claim equality with God something he should cling to. Rather he emptied himself and assuming the state of a slave, he was born in human likeness. He being known, as one of us, humbled himself, obedient unto death, even death on a cross. For this God raised him on high and bestowed on him the name which is above every other name. So that at the name of Jesus, every knee should bend, in heaven, on earth and under the earth, and so every tongue should proclaim: Jesus Christ is Lord! To God the Father's Glory."

Christianity is basically a Transformative Religion. God's Son became a human person so that human persons may become God's sons and daughters. The Incarnation is an ongoing Mystery taking place right in each of our lives and in the life of our human community. Incarnation happens in our lives as it did in Jesus' life when we empty ourselves and allow our God to fill us with Godself. Our whole life is a pilgrimage of loving transformation when we put on the mind and heart of Christ, and live our vocation with passion and joy.




The heart of the spiritual journey and the heart of kenosis and transformation is to give ourselves away in love as God always does. Karl Rahner called our God, "the prodigal who squanders himself". He says that this is how God originally created the world, through a radical out pouring of Godself. And this is certainly how Jesus redeemed it , by storing up nothing, clinging to nothing but rather giving Himself in pure self-donation in loving surrender to the Wellspring of Life. Kenosis and transformation is to empty ourselves as Jesus did so that we are not attached to ourselves or to comfort, or personal achievement, or wealth, but that we root and center our lives in loving surrender to God.

I know some of you have already visited the Holy Land. It was a faith experience for me. First, I would like to thank the pastor of Our Lady of the Angelus Parish and the parishioners, for their kindness and generosities to accommodate this trip.

I would also like to thank the Province Leadership Team that gave me the permission and opportunity for this pilgrimage. My pilgrimage to the Holy Land was a most fruitful experience. To walk in the land of the patriarch's and matriarchs, of the prophets and sages, of Jesus, Mary and Joseph and the disciples, is truly a grace.



Allow me, a first- timer to share a few of the highlights, at least the ones that moved me most. It took more than one hour from Tel Aviv airport to the hotel in Bethlehem. Our group of 31 was comprised mostly of people from our Lady of the Angelus parish. The bus ride from our hotel in Palestine to Cana, took more than an hour or so, we had all the time to pray the rosary followed by singing hymns. Three couples with Fr. John's inspirational talk and blessing, renewed their wedding vows in Cana.

In Capernaum, the little town where Jesus lived, I could picture him living in one of those stone houses and walking the dusty roads. There I was walking the very same roads he trod. The rock was there upon which Jesus proclaimed Peter as the head of the church.

I had my fill of gazing out over the Dead Sea and the Sea of Galilee both of which are actually lakes that empty into the Atlantic. Some of us took a dip in the Dead Sea and all said it was just wonderful to float around in. Big waves augmented by strong winds made it dangerous for sailing the sea of Galilee. Therefore, our boat ride was canceled but our hearty lunch of grilled St. Peter fish made up for the cancellation. It is believed that this fish is the kind that was in the multiplication of fish and bread loaves.

The paved road to Mount Tabor where the Transfiguration happened was steep with many zigzags.

We went by van in three groups. It was there that Jesus proclaimed his Divinity to Peter, John, and James. It was there I realized that of all the religious leaders of other faiths, Jesus was the only one who predicted his death and the only one who claimed and revealed that he was the son of God.

The Via Dolorosa was really a test of endurance. What with all those ups, down, and sometimes slippery steps that seemed to go on forever. I can't believe I was upon the actual tomb of Jesus. There I was, just bent over transfixed, unable to recall a single prayer and was just so awed until I was nudged to move on. Absolutely no photos were allowed here. The Western wall was a place like no other. Where can you see all people of different faiths in one place praying in their own way. You can see and hear the Jews celebrating a Bar Mitzvah, Christians fervently touching and praying before the wall, and Muslims praying as well. I dismissed any thought of possible danger as there were still places that we wanted to visit in such a short time. The hotel and the food was excellent.

The experience was over all too soon. Every single day of the trip will soon be a memory. For me it was an affirmation of faith and a renewal of spiritual strength and I can't thank the Lord enough for this opportunity. Our tour guide was just excellent and unbelievably knowledgeable in biblical history. He was more fluent in Spanish having grown up in South America but his English was perfectly understandable. Our Group was excellent, everyone felt like a family on the journey.
