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

An official communication of March 13, 2020, informed all Sisters that the Congregational Leadership Team decided: "To postpone the 15th General Chapter, that was convoked in our letter of 08 March 2019 to be held from 19 April to 21 May 2020 in our Motherhouse in Steyl, to an unspecified date." As we continue our reflection on the Chapter Prayer, we keep in mind the additional arrangements that the postponement requires.

"Triune God we long to be immersed in your life of love and share in your work of transforming the world with compassion."

Let's be honest! "Do I truly understand what I am praying for? What are the consequences of this prayer? Is this at least a desire, if not a longing, that I recognize in myself at this point of my life?" If you don't, then join me in looking for a way to reignite the original zeal and the ideal that made us knock on the door of a convent and ask for admission years ago.

Since baptism, by its very name, is an immersion, not so much in the water but in the Triune God into whom one is grafted, then much more so religious consecration. Immersed in the life of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, through religious vows, we proclaim with St. Paul: "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me; (...he) who loved me and gave himself for me." (Gal 2:20) To the extent, we cease to live and allow Christ to live in us, to that extent the divine life is implanted in us. Our baptism and religious consecration hold the

keys to the space of transformation into Christ. Knowing that we are loved by Christ enables us to love. Confident that Jesus redeemed us, we participate in the sacrifice of Christ; "filling up on my part that which is lacking of the afflictions of Christ in my flesh for his body's sake, which is the church (Col 1:24).

Think of your Lenten practices, has any of them resulted in bringing hope and compassion to, a sister in community, a person in your ministry or your neighbor? How has the experience of social distancing deepened your understanding of intimacy and of the role of other people in your life?



"Spirituality"



The following is taken from a paper by Father Tony Pernia, SVD, about some fundamental conversions needed for us to be part of God's mission today. The Lenten Season may be a good time to review them and convert where it is necessary:

From Activism to Contemplation.

Very often we are very "Pelagian" in our way of doing mission. We act as if mission depends more on our efforts than on God's grace.

From Individualism to Collaboration.

Indeed, very often, we do our work, and do it well, but it is our work and no one else's.

From Superiority to Humility.

This entails that today the missionary is called to evangelize from a position of powerlessness, lowliness and humility. He or she will not seek power – economic, cultural, technological, or even media power. The only power he or she will need is the power of the Word and of the Spirit. And that power is the power of love, which is manifested in self-giving.

From only evangelizing to also being evangelized.

Dialogue underlines the fact that the Spirit is at work in the people being evangelized as well as in the evangelizers, and that mission is a two-way exchange of gifts between missionaries and the people with whom they work. They must be prepared to change and be changed, to form and be formed, to invite to conversion and be converted.

From Burden to Privilege.

A fifth conversion is from undertaking mission as a sacrifice or a burden to experiencing it as a privilege and a gift. As St. Joseph Freinademetz, our first SVD missionary to China, wrote in one of his letters to his family: "I cannot thank the Lord enough for having made me a missionary in China" ... "When I think of the countless graces that I have received and continue to receive until now from God ... I confess that I could cry. The most beautiful vocation in the world is being a missionary".

Mission Update




Many things have been great since I got my new big and busy assignment, that is to be the pioneer of a new social foundation in Flores East, Indonesia. We station in Pada village, a very remote area, among the ex-refugees families. After doing some pastoral

ministry for several months while observing people's lives and needs, we came to a conclusion that we need to do something more than just pastoral ministry. So, our simple observation work brought us to create some

kind of "Empowering Mission Project." We begin with children through the English Program that they already perform a couple of times in some big events here. You can notice how happy they are when singing in English while dancing. Next we created one opportunity for women and girls through sewing training, and one group for the fresh fish processing program. In the meantime, I have been responsible for the project construction, so we would have rooms for training sessions, looking for ways to get donations, develop networking and partnership with government and others to get more ideas and resources.

Indeed, it's stressful but I'm happy being in this ministry. It forces me to stretch my muscles of thinking, patience, being creative, learn how to be humble, being innovative... and much more.

As we finished the readings we were invited again to come forward. Now we were holding a clay jar in our hands,







When the first Sisters in Maria Hall sniffled, Corona virus was still 'abroad' but then in no time arrived and changed our lives at the Convent of the Holy Spirit as certainly changed yours. Sisters from Maria Hall upon consultation of Sr. Judy, the Director of Nursing, Barbara, and doctors, sheltered each in her room, with a warning on most doors "No visitors please". This means that fewer of us have been gathering in the chapel observing regular prayer times, Communion Celebration or televised Eucharistic celebration, while the pix can hardly contain the number of hosts needed for the Sisters isolated in their rooms. There were no more common meals in Maria Hall or daily activities. It has been hard for the Sisters to be on their own for the long days and hard for us not being able to visit and hold their hands when communication is difficult.

Each door and strategic point in the house was armed with a bottle of hand sanitizer and we rubbed it in religiously in addition to all the hand washing. A big sign NO VISITORS on the front door is visible from far away. Meetings with all Heads of Departments has happened regularly, employees more often than not appear in masks and gloves strategizing for a possible future shutdown. Sisters were assigned to learn to operate critical equipment like the industrial laundry and drier, dishwasher, stove, steamer and more. So far, the skills learned have not been put to use but we have yet a way to go. We join all fellow Illinoisans in social distancing, in isolation when necessary, but especially in prayers for the millions of people affected by the pandemic.

Thank you dear Sisters for communicating the situation in your communities and your concern about our senior Sisters especially. Thank you for the calls you have made to brighten the solitude of the quarantined Sisters. Sr. Edel Maria, SSpS notified the US Province that St.Kitts Health Care confirmed two cases of Covid-19 which will cause all schools to close immediately. Please pray for the patients, people, & Sisters in St. Kitts. Sr. Yuliana Meno, SSpS tries her best to keep her teachers and students engaged at home without the commodity of e-teaching. Our Directors of Religious Education are having an especially stressful time given that spring is the usual time for reception of sacraments by the children. The Holy Spirit Life Learning Center has not reopened after the spring break. Let us find strength in communicating with each other and supporting one another.

Most importantly, no Sister, employee, volunteer, or family member has tested positive for Covid-19, so let's "wash our hands" and raise them in prayer!

It is important to establish a common understanding of the purpose of communication side by side with media and technology. The world is changing at a very rapid pace, which calls us to adapt our missionary practices to this change. Communication had a special spark in the heart of St. Arnold Janssen. Since the time of our First Mothers—Bl. Maria Helena Stollenwerk, Bl. Josepha Stenmanns and Mother Theresia Messner—SSpS Communication has evolved in our Congregation. From letter writing to publishing newsletters and mission magazines, our Sisters maintained connections and conversations across mission fields, not only updating

one another but also exchanging tips on what worked and did not work in particular milieus. Thus, for the sake of evangelization, as stated in our Constitutions 107.3, the use of different means of communication were promoted, and there were always some Sisters who worked in radio and TV programs as well as in the publication of reflections and articles in various magazines and local newspapers.

During these times of great difficulty we as the Church of Jesus Christ have both an obligation as well as a great opportunity to creatively calm the flames of fear and unrest by sharing the Gospel of our Lord wherever we can. Social distancing has not prohibited us from our responsibility to communication, it has however given us a greater appreciation for the precious gift of communion. While we cannot meet face to face we can send our love through social media tools, telephone calls, letters, email, etc. The Holy Bible says that we are surrounded by a "great cloud of witnesses". Our founding generation never let world problems stop the sharing of the Gospel. Let us pray for the courage & strength to continue that legacy.

AN AMAZING GRACE

In the past two years, the US Province has received two grants from Catholic Volunteer Network (CVN) as part of their "From Service to Sisterhood Initiative." Through this initiative, in partnership with the Conrad N. Hilton Fund for Sisters, CVN provided funding to congregations of women religious who want to initiate or expand volunteer programs. The idea is to give more opportunities to lay persons to work alongside sisters, share in their way of life, and discern their own calling to vocation. The previous funding has been used primarily to support the development of a new lay volunteer program, vocation promotion efforts, and volunteer recruitment efforts for the Holy Spirit Life Learning Center (HSLLC)'s Summer Peace Camp.

In late February, CVN's Program Manager of From Service to Sisterhood (now called VOCARE Initiative) contacted Arantxa Martinez to share about a new funding opportunity. The Program Manager explained that CVN was accepting applications for Sustainability Projects to support the longevity of previously funded volunteer programs. Arantxa discussed a few ideas with Sr. Dorota M. Piechaczek, and one possibility that stood out is a Promotional Video Project. The idea is to create one or a series of short videos featuring volunteers who serve in various capacities within the Province (e.g. volunteers in the Convent, at the HSLLC). The Communications Team, Andrew Dixon, III and Sr. Rosalia Galmin, also gave their input for this project since they would be heavily involved in it. Andrew put together a budget for supplies and camera equipment that would be needed to carry out the project. Arantxa submitted the grant proposal during the first week of March, and an approval letter as well as the grant check arrived at the Convent the week of March 16. CVN approved a grant of \$6,000 to cover the cost of the Video Project and a few other things for the volunteer program.

With the Promotional Video Project, we hope to document and evaluate the impact of the volunteer opportunities offered through the Province on lay persons, especially on young women. The videos will provide qualitative data which can be integrated to help in the development of the volunteer program. We are very grateful to CVN for this grant opportunity and we look forward to sharing the outcome of the project in a few months.
